WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE STUDY?

The purpose of this study is to understand factors related to tobacco use among cancer survivors and understand the role of oncology and primary care providers in delivering tobacco cessation treatment.

WHAT CAN PARTICIPANTS EXPECT?

Participation in this study is voluntary. If you decide to participate in this study, you will be asked to allow us to record your voice during an interview that will ask questions about your cancer and smoking history. A member of the study team will conduct the interview either in-person at a Cherokee Nation health center or through video-conferencing. The interview will take about one hour. At the beginning of the interview, you will be asked to complete a brief questionnaire to answer questions with a study coordinator about your experiences related to tobacco use and quit attempts. You will receive a \$25 gift card for completing the study.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE IN THIS STUDY?

To be included in the study, you must be 21 years old or older, able to read and speak English, diagnosed with cancer in the last five years, currently receiving healthcare from Cherokee Nation Health Services, and be a current tobacco user or former tobacco user who was using tobacco at the time of your cancer diagnosis.

WHAT ARE THE POSSIBLE BENEFITS OF THIS STUDY?

If you agree to take part in this study, there will not be direct medical benefit to you. We hope that the information learned from this study will benefit other patients with this disease in the future.
